

English Literacy - KS3

Overview

A literacy curriculum is a structured plan of instruction designed to develop and enhance reading, speaking, and listening skills in learners of all ages. A literacy curriculum recognises the importance of oral language development and includes opportunities for students to engage in conversations, presentations, and collaborative activities. It emphasises active listening, speaking clearly and coherently, and participating in discussions to express ideas and opinions.

Literature and Textual Analysis: A literacy curriculum often incorporates the study of literature to foster a love for reading and to deepen students' understanding of literary elements, themes, and literary devices. It may involve analysing and interpreting texts, discussing literary techniques, and exploring different genres and authors.

Information Literacy and Media Literacy: In today's digital age, a comprehensive literacy curriculum also addresses information literacy and media literacy skills. Students learn how to find, evaluate, and use information from various sources critically. They also develop skills to analyse and interpret media messages, understand bias, and navigate the complexities of the digital world responsibly.
