We are delighted to announce that Impact North West Schools has been awarded the Bronze Award for Unicef's Rights Respecting Schools. This is a significant achievement that reflects our ongoing commitment to creating a school culture where every child's rights are valued, respected, and promoted. The Rights Respecting Schools framework encourages students to understand their rights under the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) and empowers them to become active participants in shaping a more respectful and inclusive school environment. Achieving the Bronze Award is a fantastic first step, and we are already working towards the Silver Award by embedding these values more deeply into our daily school life.

At Impact North West Schools, we are excited to introduce our IMPACT Challenges — a series of carefully designed activities aimed at developing key personal qualities such as resilience, leadership, teamwork, creativity, and problemsolving. These challenges are tailored to help students push their boundaries, build confidence, and develop essential life skills in a supportive and motivating environment. From inter-house competitions in STEM, creative writing, and sports to real-world problem-solving tasks and leadership opportunities, the IMPACT Challenges encourage students to take ownership of their learning, work collaboratively with their peers, and develop a positive, can-do attitude. These challenges are a key part of our wider Character Education programme, helping students grow into well-rounded, confident individuals ready to succeed in life beyond school.

Through these challenges, students get the chance to:

Build resilience by trying new things and overcoming obstacles. Foster teamwork by working together on group tasks and learning how to communicate effectively. Develop leadership skills by taking the lead in projects or mentoring others. Show empathy and kindness through community-based activities or acts of service. Set personal goals and reflect on their progress, helping them to see just how much they're capable of achieving.



By creating an environment where students feel safe and valued, we see real progress—not just academically, but in confidence, independence, and emotional regulation.

Your child will also be allocated a head of year who will liaise with Suzy to develop initiatives, meet with external agencies and develop guidance to staff about how best to meet their eeds

We regularly liaise with Family Intervention Workers, Social Workers, School Health, and other external agencies to ensure the best possible support is provided to the family



On Vapes.....

At Impact North West Schools, we maintain a zero-tolerance policy on vapes. It is illegal to facilitate or enable the use of vapes by anyone under the age of 18, and as such, any vapes found on site will be immediately confiscated.
